## CAN YOU AFFORD TO MAKE CONCESSIONS?


With an estimated 26 million software developers in the world and counting (Evans Data), there's a good chance that somebody has built software that fulfills at least part of your current business needs.

If this is the case, you'll need to ask some additional questions to get to a clearer answer:

- Does the off-the-shelf product completely solve your business challenge? Some businesses settle for software that only meets a portion of their requirements. You'll have to weigh the cost of this sacrifice against the cost of a long-term solution over time.
- Does it integrate with your existing in-house systems?
   You've invested years of funds, training, and data into your
   existing software systems. Custom software systems are
   built to your specifications and can easily integrate with
   your setup, but not all ready-made solutions carry the
   connection points you need
- Can it continue to meet your business needs into the future? Today, you might be willing to settle for something without a customizable user interface or a specific feature. But in a few years, as your organization grows, you may find you need to update anyway. The cost of moving off the existing platform and onto a different one may be significant, time-consuming, and painful for the business.
- Will you be sacrificing good design or user experience in choosing this product? The most important factor for many businesses is that software works the way it's supposed to. But poor design can destroy customer experience in client-facing interfaces, and hurt productivity with internal software.

With a pre-built software solution, you are held to whatever features the commercial developer deems most important or necessary.

These solutions may include a certain amount of user control--configurations that let you tailor the product to your business needs, at least to an extent.

Where configurations aren't available, however, you will have to...

- A. Deal with the software as-is;
- B. Speak to the software's development team and hope they make time to prioritize your request over (likely) hundreds of others and the existing product roadmap; or,
- C. Hire a developer to build a separate custom solution that works with your existing off-the-shelf product.

In other words, there may be a time you have to hire a software development company anyway, to create a customization or new software that fits your requirements for control.

Thus begins the long process of transitioning to new software or a new platform after investing months or even years into the previous one.


Why not start off with a custom software build and have the control you'll want in the future?

Cumbersome or confusing UX can lead to lost productivity, which has major implications for the business.


## DOES THAT CUSTOM SOLUTION REALLY COST MORE?

Many people assume that custom software development will cost more than buying off the shelf. In reality, that's just the initial cost. Most off-the-shelf products, whether cloud-based or on-prem, have a long-term fee structure that adds up over time. A custom solution that you own is a one-time investment (with minimal maintenance costs).



## THE REAL COST OF OFF-THE-SHELF

- Monthly subscription fees
- Plug-ins and customizations
- Integration services
- Paying for features you don't even use
- Paying for additional seats as your company grows



With custom software, there are no ongoing costs outside of bug fixes or modifications. Adding a new feature later carries a one-time cost for the additional effort, but when that occurs is up to you.
