### Softest Brexit is rejected by MPs

SQUABBLING MPs yet again failed to come up with a majority for any softer Brexit alternative in last night's second round of voting.

All four options debated during the indicative vote process were defeated in a huge block No vote by Tory MPs.

One - a Customs Union with the EU - lost by just three votes, 273 to 276.

In dramatic scenes after the results were announced, rebel Tory leader Nick Boles, who proposed Norway-style EEA membership, quit

# SAUDI OIL FIRM'S £85BN PROFITS

SAUDI Arabia's national oil company made profits of £85 billion last year more than any other company on the planet. Saudi Aramco, which produces ten per cent-plus of the globe's crude oil, made £233million per day. Profits were almost double those of Apple, at £45.3billion. The staggering figures mean it leap-frogs the tech giant as the world's most profitable company. The figures also dwarf those of rival Royal Dutch Shell, at £17.8billion. This is the first time the state-run oil firm has disclosed its financial performance. Before tax was paid, Aramco generated an astonishing £171billion in oil earnings. The disclosure was made in a prospectus aimed at courting investors ahead of its debut international bond sale. The company is preparing to raise debt in part to pay for a big stake in Sabic, a petrochemicals group worth about £52billion. Rehan Akbar, of Moody's ratings agency, said: "Saudi Aramco has many characteristics of a AAA-rated corporate, with minimal debt relative to cash-flows."

### Jumpin' back to his best

HEART expert Professor Tim Chico said Mick's operation could give him a new lease of life on stage. He added: "Heart valve replacement surgery is usually very successful and does not place a bar on people returning to their professional life. "Mick could be back performing within months, and if the procedure eases any breathlessness, he may be more energetic than previously." Doctors are increasingly using keyhole techniques rather than open heart surgery because it does not cause big scars and patients return to full health within a month.

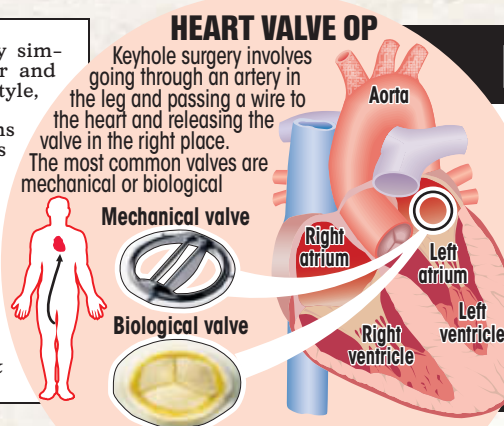

heal, unlike open heart surgery. A patient can expect to go home within 24 to 48 hours, feel well one or two weeks later and be back to normal health after a month. "The procedure is highly successful and if all goes well, it is possible Mick will have more energy than previously." The problem heart valve was picked up during a medical ahead of the band's North American tour. It led to the shock announcement on Saturday that the band was postponing the 17-date, sell-out tour

because Mick needed unspecified medical treatment. The heart valve procedure is said to have a 95 per cent success rate. A source said yesterday: "Mick will be undergoing a heart valve procedure. The prognosis is good and this kind of surgery has a high success rate." Heart valve problems have a number of potential causes. Professor Tim Chico, a heart expert from Sheffield University, added: "The valve may have narrowed or become leaky, which places pressure on the heart. "The valve could have been damaged by an infection or it may simply be caused by general wear and tear. It's not linked to lifestyle, drink, drugs or cholesterol. ## Jagger postponed tour 'to have heart surgery'

**S**ir Mick Jagger is to have heart surgery, according to unconfirmed reports from the United States (David Sunderland writes).

The singer of the Rolling Stones said at the weekend that he was devastated by the postponement of the group's tour of North America, adding that he would be "working very hard to be back on stage as soon as I can". The band's publicist said that he was having medical treatment.

The *Dredger Report*, an influential American website, said that Sir Mick, 75, would undergo an aortic valve replacement in New York this week. It requires open heart surgery and can take between two and three months to recover from, depending on individual conditions, according to

the British Heart Foundation. The New York Post's Page Six website reported that Sir Mick would have a stent fitted, a less invasive procedure to strengthen a narrowed artery.

Yesterday Sir Mick was photographed on a beach in Miami with his girlfriend Melanie Harris, 32, their son Deveraux, two, and the singer's daughter Georgia May, 27. Keith Richards, 75, and Ronnie Wood, 71, the Rolling Stones guitarists, were photographed separately in Miami.

The group had been preparing for 17 concerts in North America when Sir Mick's pre-tour medical check highlighted a previously undiagnosed condition. The *Dredger Report*

said that the singer would be back on stage by the summer. Those with tickets have been advised to keep them for the rearranged dates.

Members of the band have had several health scares during 57 years together, many attributed to drugs and alcohol.

Sir Mick is thought to have been following a strict diet and exercise regime. He said on social media at the weekend:

"I'm devastated for having to postpone the tour but I will be working very hard to be back on stage as soon as I can. Once again, huge apologies to everyone." Sir Mick's publicist did not respond to requests for comment last night.

## Analysis

**H**eat valve surgery is a routine operation, including for elderly people (Niles Samani writes). For a person in good health the prognosis is good, with a risk as low as 1 to 2 per cent.

The length of the surgery and recovery time depend on the type of operation and valve involved. With open heart surgery the patient takes two to three hours, with a week in hospital followed by convalescence of up to three months before a patient is fully recovered.

Advances in heart surgery over the past 50 years mean that if the patient is suffering from aortic stenosis — a narrowing of the aortic valve opening — a prosthetic aortic valve can be inserted through a blood vessel.

In this case the recovery time is much shorter. Patients can leave hospital within a day or two and can usually resume normal activities in one to two weeks. Professor Sir Niles Samani is BHF medical director and professor of cardiology at the University of Leicester.

# Schools under lockdown as police hunt knifeman

## Teachers and nurses cannot stop stabbings, May is told

## Factsheet

Schools were placed under lockdown yesterday as police continued to hunt for the man who stabbed four people in the back within a matter of hours.

The attacker is not thought to have known any of his victims. One of them said: "why has this happened to me?", a witness said.

Pupils in Edmonton, north London, were forbidden from leaving their schools during their breaks and told to be on their guard. Although two men were arrested on suspicion of grievous bodily harm on Sunday, Scotland Yard said that the hunt was still under way.

The attacker, described as a black man, about 6ft 3in and wearing a dark hoodie, is thought to have selected his victims at random, targeting people who were "alone and vulnerable" in the street. Mental health issues may be a concern, police said.

The attacks began on Saturday evening when a 45-year-old woman was stabbed in the back as she walked along Aberdon Road, a residential street at about 7pm. Just after midnight a 52-year-old man was knifed in the back in

nearby Park Avenue. The third victim, a 23-year-old man, was found just before dawn on Sunday near Seven Sisters Tube station, about a mile away. He had been stabbed in Silver Street.

The fourth attack took place just before dawn that day on the corner of Fore Street and Fiskestrade Road, near the scene of the second stabbing. A 29-year-old man believed to have been on his way to the bus stop to go to work was stabbed in the back.

As forensic science teams continued to search debris and undergrowth for weapons, parents were told that children would be subject to stricter security measures.

Maureen Collett, head teacher of the Layton School, told parents in an email that a "lockdown procedure" was in place to ensure students felt safe. "For precautionary purposes students are not allowed to leave the school premises during break time and lunchtime until further notice... Students should bring their own food to eat; they will not be able to order food or leave the building to purchase food."

She added: "The general advice is that students should walk to and from

school in pairs or small groups, stick to the main roads rather than making short cuts and for students to be aware of their surroundings as they are walking. Students are advised not to listen to music or be distracted by their smartphones when walking."

The Nightingale Academy also said that lockdown procedures were in place.

The woman and the 23-year-old man remain in hospital in a critical condition. The 29-year-old man also remains in hospital but his injuries are not said to be life-threatening. The 52-year-old man has been discharged.

Roger Blackman, 46, a local worker, described seeing the 29-year-old first aid. "I saw a man kneeling down," he said. "He stood up and I could see he was holding his back and he started walking. I think he was in shock. He was saying 'Oh my God, help me. Why has this happened to me? Someone help me.' He walked and then fell down."

The first man was arrested on Fore Street just before 11am on Sunday. The second man, believed to be in his forties, was arrested in the street in Edmonton at about 5pm that day.

Police officers, teachers and nurses have criticised government proposals on knife crime and fear that the measures will shift the blame on to under-resourced public sector workers.

There was May said that the nationwide knife crime epidemic would not be ended through arrests alone as she opened a meeting focusing on serious youth violence yesterday.

More than 100 experts are meeting this week after Sajid Javid, the home secretary, put forward the idea of a "public health duty" designed to ensure that public sector staff spot the signs that a young person is in danger and ensure proper action is taken.

The Police Federation, the National Education Union and Royal College of Nursing all raised concerns yesterday over the possible implications for staff.

The meeting began after another week of violence in London with several stabbings and a one-man knife rampage in which four people were attacked apparently at random.

Mrs May said: "We cannot simply arrest ourselves out of this problem. This is a wider problem, it is more deep-seated and we have to have a more co-ordinated effort."

A consultation with the public and

professionals in England and Wales began yesterday. It will assess the extent to which those on the front line will be held to account for failing to prevent a young person getting involved in violence.

Examples given included "presenting in A&E with a suspicious injury, worrying behaviour at school or issues at home" the Home Office said.

John Apter, the national chairman of the Police Federation for England and Wales, said: "What I fully accept we have to look forward, I think the government and the prime minister in particular has to shoulder some of the responsibility for the government's failed policies. What she's done to policing is unforgivable and she's now seeing the impact of that."

Diane Donna Kinnair of the Royal College of Nursing said: "Nursing staff already have a key role in safeguarding patients, whether that's working in the community, in schools or in hospitals. It's unclear how putting a further obligation on our members, already working incredibly hard to do all they can for patients, will prevent violent crime."

Mary Bousted, of the National Education Union, said: "Neither the blame for or the solution to violent crime can be laid at the door of schools or front-line hospital staff."

## 'Escobar' lives on in drug bust

Up to \$20 million in heroin and fentanyl have been seized at a Harlem apartment — including some in packages paying homage to the notorious drug kingpin Pablo Escobar, authorities said on Monday.

Several bricks of the drugs bore labels reading "Pablo" and "Escobar" and had a photo of the late Colombian cartel boss on them (above), the Drug Enforcement Administration said.

"This organization used a photo of Pablo Escobar, who was known as the King of Cocaine, to mark their product," DEA Agent-in-Charge Ray Donovan said. "Albeit this seizure was not cocaine, it shows a sign of the times, that heroin/fentanyl are the traffickers' most profitable and plentiful product and the public's deadliest threat."

Two suspected dealers were nabbed and \$200,000 found in the operation Thursday at 630 Lenox Ave.

New York Drug Enforcement Task Force and Homeland Security Investigations agents carried out the raid.

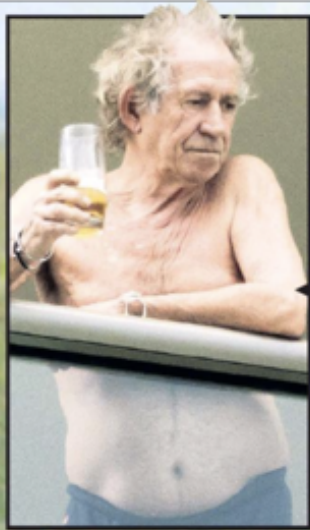

Who thought he'd be the Stone to crack? Mick Jagger will undergo heart surgery in New York City this week, sources told The Post — as his permanently pickled bandmate Keith Richards continues his march toward seeming immortality.

The 75-year-old Rolling Stones frontman will come to get his ticker fixed following the band's announcement last week that it was pushing pause on the US leg of its No Filter Tour, which had been set to kick off in a couple of weeks.

Doctors will put in a stent to prop up at least one of his arteries, according to sources close to Jagger.

Despite his age, Jagger still has time on his side and is expected to make a full recovery thanks to his hale physical condition, sources added.

Noting that normally with such a procedure "you can be back at work within weeks," one source speculated that the band's postponement "could be because the health checks are all set into the insurance for the tour. Maybe they're being careful."

Jagger — a father of eight and grandfather of five — is known for his healthy living, which includes a fitness regimen, an organic diet and thousand-dollar skin-care products.

Meanwhile, Richards, also 75, has long

been the butt of jokes over his unflagging health despite smoking like a chimney and generally treating his body like a DEA evidence locker.

The hard-living, hard-rocking guitarist called sobriety "novel" when he cleaned up in 2008. He has kicked the heroin and cocaine that fueled him for decades.

"Drugs are not interesting these days. They are very institutionalized and bland. And, anyway, I've done 'em all," he told The Independent that year.

Last week, Richards tweeted out his sympathies to his musical partner in crime since 1962.

"A big disappointment for everyone but things need to be taken care of and we will see you soon. Mick, we are always there for you!" the guitar slinger wrote.

Richards survived Nazi bombing raids growing up in World War II London, was nearly electrocuted onstage in 1965, awoke to flames after setting his bed ablaze with a cigarette in 1971, and accidentally dosed himself with strychnine-laced cocaine a few years later.

Still, his only major health scare came in 2006, when doctors removed a blood clot from his brain.

A year later, he snorted his dead father's ashes cut with cocaine — or was it vice versa?

"It went down pretty well, and I'm still alive," Richards recalled to The Guardian.

Farce as Commons fails to agree any Brexit plan AGAIN ++ Soft Brexit MP quits Tories ++ Cabinet chief's leaked letter warns of No Deal crisis

MPs deepened the political crisis last night by again rejecting every Brexit option.

With just 11 days until the UK is due to leave the EU, the Commons failed to find a majority for any of the alternatives to the Prime Minister's withdrawal plan.

MPs rejected staying in the customs union or the single market, as well as holding a second referendum or cancelling Brexit altogether.

Theresa May will this morning gather her ministers for a crucial five-hour Cabinet meeting. Brexiters ministers have threatened to quit if she moves toward a soft Brexit. Others say they will resign if she pursues No Deal.

A highly-placed source described today's gathering as 'the mother of all Cabinet meetings', adding: 'They have got some very, very big decisions to take.'

Last night's deadlock - which saw former Tory minister Nick Boles cross the floor of the House - could breathe life into Mrs May's plan after three defeats. The prospect of a general election or a No Deal departure also rose.

The Mail yesterday saw leaked extracts of a bombshell letter from Cabinet Secretary Sir Mark Sedwill warning ministers how disastrous No Deal could be. It warned the Cabinet

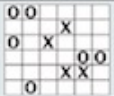

The rock legend, 75, is expected to undergo a heart operation in New York this week after the group's US tour was postponed.

But surgery seemed to be the last thing on his mind as he enjoyed family time on Miami beach on Sunday.

Sir Mick played with his two-year-old son Deveraux in his girlfriend Melanie Hamrick, 32, looked on.

He was also joined on the trip by model daughter Georgia May, 27.

Sir Mick's doctor has advised him not to go on stage for a few weeks, but he is expected to make a full recovery and return to performing this summer.

But while the Stones frontman enjoyed the quiet life, his bandmate Keith Richards, 75, stood shirtless downing a beer.

Bandmate Ronnie Wood, 71, his wife Sally, 41, and their two-year-old twin daughters Grace, Jane and Alice Rose also enjoyed the beach visit.

The Stones' US tour had been due to start on April 20 in Miami, Florida, finishing in Canada on June 29.

A band statement said: "Mick has been advised by doctors that he cannot go on tour at this time, as he needs medical treatment. The doctors have advised Mick that he is expected to make a complete recovery."

Sir Mick told fans: "I'm devastated for having to postpone the tour but I will be working very hard to be back on stage as soon as I can."
