Home at last

The wife of a British man whose baby was swapped at birth in El Salvador has shown off their child publicly, as their lawyer claimed infants had been mixed up in five related cases. Richard Cushworth, 41, and his Salvadoran wife Mercy Casanellas, 39, who live in the United States, raised the wrong boy for three months before DNA tests proved their suspicions. They have named their biological son Moses, and are suing the hospital

THE dad of a baby feared to have been sold to human traffickers yesterday got his "beautiful ending" as he was

reunited with his son.

Brit Richard Cushworth and wife Mercedes Casanellas thought they would never see their boy again after he was swapped at a hospital in El Salvador.

But Mercedes called it a "miracle" after the three month old was found. He was living with a couple whose own child was born the same day at the Central American hospital.

A DNA test later proved the children had been switched. Devout Christian Mercedes said: "God has answered our prayers."

Richard, 39, originally from Bradford, and his wife, 42, were reunited with their real son after an emotional meeting with the other shocked family.

Missionary Richard, who now lives in Dallas, Texas, said: "There were times we did not know where this would go.

"It was such a long day but with such a beautiful ending."

Gynaecologist Dr Alejandro Guidos is on bail facing charges over the clinic's blunder.

Richard's dad David, an ex-policeman from Bradford, added: "The official story appears to show it was a mistake, a mix-up.
"I feel for the other family. They only found out today that their baby is not really theirs."

Former decorator Richard and Mercedes called their biological son Moses after the Biblical boy hidden away and found in the bulrushes, gran Lynne revealed.

But as they took him home for his first night, Mercedes admitted she still thinks about Jacob, the other baby they were raising. She said: "I am so happy but I could barely sleep. I could not help but think about him too."

The couple decided to have their child near to Mercedes' family in capital San Salvador.

But Moses was born premature and Richard missed the birth.

Mercedes became suspicious when the boy they were given to take home had darker skin and different features than at birth.
